Making strategic and transformational grants is the most effective way to create positive changes in the community and inspire philanthropy.



Endowments created by partner organizations are identified as "Organizational Funds" within the ESVCF assets. ESVCF maintains an ongoing program of creating Organizational Funds for local nonprofit organizations. These relationships allow for management of dedicated endowments by the Hampton Roads Community Foundation through ESVCF while generating an annual income for the nonprofit. The Eastern Shore Community College Foundation created the first Organizational Fund with ESVCF in 2006. Since then, several additional partner groups have created endowments. ESVCF looks forward to assisting additional partner groups in the years ahead through this growing program.

How To Become A Donor

The Eastern Shore of Virginia Community Foundation offers simple and effective options for donors who wish to improve their community through philanthropy. All gifts to ESVCF can be funded with cash or through the donation of securities, real estate, or stock.

Funds Available To Donors

DONOR ADVISED FUNDS - Donor advisors can contribute assets at any time and then recommend to the Foundation grants to nonprofit organizations from the advised funds they have established.

FIELD OF INTEREST FUNDS - Donors are able to address an area of concern, such as arts and culture, education, the environment or human services. These funds allow the Foundation's Board to choose specific nonprofit organizations as grant recipients who meet a donor's criteria.

UNRESTRICTED FUNDS - These funds support responsive and strategic grants and broad, evolving community needs. Decisions on using these funds are left to the discretion of the Foundation's Board of Directors, which regularly reviews proposals from area nonprofit organizations.

SCHOLARSHIP FUNDS - These funds provide students with financial resources for college and other educational opportunities. Donors can establish criteria for the scholarship.

DESIGNATED FUNDS - Donors are able to select specific nonprofit organizations to receive support as long as the organizations remain in existence and continue their charitable purposes.



Investment Overview

Hampton Roads Community Foundation

Year Ending December 31, 2012

The affiliate relationship between the Eastern Shore of Virginia Community Foundation and the Hampton Roads Community Foundation places stewardship of ESVCF capital assets with the Hampton Roads Community Foundation. Through its investment committee, which has investment oversight responsibility for an endowment of approximately \$239 million, the Hampton Roads Community Foundation seeks to invest resources prudently in order to preserve and grow the endowment's capacity to fund grants in accordance with donors' wishes today and in the future.

The Hampton Roads Community Foundation is committed to being a good steward of the assets entrusted to it by generous donors over the past 63 years. HRCF invests its resources wisely so they grow to meet future needs while providing funds for grants and scholarships today.

Oversight of their investment portfolio is handled by their investment committee, which works with their investment manager, Spider Management Company LLC of Richmond. In 2011 the community foundation began investing with Spider Management through its Richmond Fund. The community foundation joins University of Richmond and 22 other nonprofit endowments as Spider Management partners.

Spider Management focuses on diversification through approximately 70 portfolio managers. Below is a list of asset classes in which Spider Management invests. It also gives a snapshot of the portfolio's asset allocation as of December 31, 2012.





Foundation Supports Four Museums

During the eight year history of the Foundation, grants totaling \$148,031 have been awarded to four Eastern Shore Museums from unrestricted funds with a focus on Arts and Culture and Education, two of the six areas used for grantmaking in Accomack and Northampton counties.

Museum of Chincoteague Island

In 2010 a grant of \$49,000 was awarded the Museum of Chincoteague Island. The funds were earmarked for a new roof, entrance way and replacement of windows at the museum which attracts thousands of visitors annually. The grant was made as a part of the re-dedication from the Oyster Museum to the renamed Museum of Chincoteague Island.

The facility houses the First Order Fresnel Lens from the Assateague Island Lighthouse, the iconic Chincoteague ponies known as Misty and Stormy, models of vessels that plied the Chincoteague waters long ago, oral histories and artifacts that tell the story of Chincoteague Island life throughout its' long and varied existence. The mission of the museum is to collect and preserve the material culture that reflects the historical progression of life on Chincoteague Island.

The new roof and windows allow for protection of the valuable items that document the history of the island so that future generations will have an understanding of life on Chincoteague. The new entrance way allows visitors to enter the building that creates a repository for all things Chincoteague.


Eastern Shore of Virginia Historical Society

Also in 2010, the Foundation awarded \$19,031 to the Eastern Shore of Virginia Historical Society for installation of a security and monitoring system, period-appropriate outdoor lighting for the grounds at Ker Place (the society's headquarters in Onancock) and renovations and repairs to the historic building. The mission of the Historical Society is to preserve and interpret the history of the Eastern Shore and to educate the community about its past through the museum's collections.

The collections of the Historical Society hold vast and important intellectual tools for education and research, and the new security and monitoring system gives protection to the valuable historic properties, artifacts, archives, and a library. All of these facets of the museum are used in exhibits, educational programs and research projects. Ker Place, one of three properties owned by the Society, is a National Historic landmark property.

The building was in need of some repair and the grant allowed the Society to make important improvements to the facility that holds the vast and important intellectual tools for education and research. The new period exterior lighting also gives additional protection to the property while aiding visitors during nighttime use of the facility.

Cape Charles Historical Society

In 2010 the Foundation also awarded a \$10,000 grant to the Cape Charles Historical Society to help with repairs and replacement of the ceiling and new roof on the museum building in historic Cape Charles. The museum, which opened in 1996, is dedicated to preserving and presenting to the public the history of Cape Charles and the surrounding area. It is the hope of the Society that inspiration from the richness of its past will help guide Cape Charles renewal and growth.

The building, which houses the Historical Society, was constructed by the Eastern Shore Public Service Company in 1947 to house two diesel powered electric generators and was subsequently acquired by Delmarva Power. The building served as a peaking unit facility into the 1980s. One of the engines, a 16 ½ bore Busch-Sulzer diesel fuel injection model, remains in the building as a

permanent exhibit. With the new ceiling and roof in place the Historical Society's rich collection of early postcards, photographs, timetables, documents and objects which encompass the beginnings of Cape Charles in the 1880s are well protected. Other items of local interest include "story boards" and models of Eastern Shore sailing vessels, steamers, workboats, barges, and ferries; railroad china, switch locks, Indian artifacts; and school memorabilia.

Visitors to this unique building may also view items from the Museum's "Country Store Collection" and learn about the Chesapeake Bay crater, the largest in the United States, created 35 million years ago, including a collection of rocks from the one mile core sample taken near Cape Charles in 2005.

The Barrier Islands Center of Virginia's Eastern Shore

The Barrier Islands Center was awarded a \$70,000 grant in 2011 to help renovate the interior of the 1810 African-American Almshouse on the Center's property in Machipongo. The museum itself offers an intriguing view of life on these now abandoned Atlantic barrier islands and a detailed museum tour interprets the islands' history and culture.

In response to the community's appetite for educational opportunities, increased requests

for meeting space, and a growing collection of artifacts, the Center began renovations of the 1910 African-American Almshouse to augment its gallery space by fifty percent and expand its educational programs. Virginia Department of Transportation Enhancement funding provided a new slate roof for the building. The Eastern Shore of Virginia Community Foundation grant helped fund interior renovations and increase the Center's capacity to serve the Eastern Shore community. At 2,233 square feet, the 1910 building will house a permanent Eastern Shore African-American history exhibit, the Beazley Foundation Meeting Room, an oral history recording studio, incubator



gallery space, curatorial workspace, exhibit storage, bathrooms and a kitchenette.

The farm affords an in-depth experience of the living conditions of the rural poor in the 19th century south. Still a working farm today, the property has three historically significant buildings and heirloom gardens.

The Eastern Shore of Virginia Community Foundation is pleased to have played a part in helping the four museums meet their needs for expansion and improvements. The \$148,031 total of the four grants is a small price for the educational opportunities afforded local citizens as well as thousands of visitors to Virginia's Eastern Shore.
