

Donald J. Trufant



In February, the Eastern Shore lost a friend. Donald J. Trufant, passed away at the age of 83.

Don retired as Executive Vice President of Mercantile – Safe Deposit & Trust in Baltimore, and moved to the Eastern Shore, his adopted home, in the early 1990s. For almost 20 years he was elected or volunteered to serve with a number of organizations.

He will long be remembered for his many generous philanthropic contributions and his service to the Eastern Shore community, which he so loved. Don was a true gentleman and a friend to all.

Elected to the first board of this Foundation, he served for six years with integrity, desire, leadership, and love for the people of our two county area. Without Don's knowledge, good nature, and dedication, this organization would not have achieved the recognition and success it has today. It was his foresight and knowledge that helped the Foundation establish its footprint in our community.

Don never sought recognition. During his tenure on the foundation's grant review committee, he and other members were doing a sight visit to a local organization. During the visit Don mentioned there was a need for comfortable chairs, but was told the money was not available. The next day the organization received his personal check for the purchase of the chairs. This was the kind of man Don Trufant was, he never wanted fanfare, but was always ready to help where needs existed.

Longfellow wrote, "The heart hath its own memory, like the mind. And in it are enshrined the precious keepsakes, into which is wrought the giver's loving thought". This was Don Trufant.

It sounds too simple to just say thank you to someone for all they have done, and the friendship they shared. However, those two words are most appropriate in this case. Don, Thank You! We miss you with all our heart.

As the Eastern Shore of Virginia Community Foundation completes its tenth full year of operation, it is extremely gratifying to have been able to help 52 charities with grants totaling \$1,632,159, 11 in 2014 alone. It is only through the generosity of the donors here on the Eastern Shore that we have been able to assist so many organizations.

The Foundation was established in October 2004 to benefit the residents of the Eastern Shore. The Foundation focuses entirely on 501(c)(3) organizations in Accomack and Northampton counties. The areas of investment include:

- Education Improve students' readiness to learn and ability to succeed in school and life
- Healthcare—Support healthcare services and wellness education through community organizations
- Family Child Social Welfare Improve the quality of life for families and communities
- Public and Civil Life Preserve and increase access to our unique community assets
- Arts and Culture Promote broad-based participation in arts and cultural activities
- Environment Support environmental preservation and education

Many of the charitable organizations on the Eastern Shore struggle to raise the funds to support their programs. Grants from the Foundation enable them to continue their work, as you will see in this Annual Report.

Today the Foundation has 35 funds under management. This includes 13 funds established by organizations as permanent endowments to support their work, 6 designated funds, 7 unrestricted funds and 9 donor-advised funds that allow the donors to recommend grants for specific non-profit organizations.

I urge you to consider donating to the Foundation. No gift is too small. Through our collective commitment to community philanthropy, we can help ensure a bright future for the Eastern Shore.

HAMPTON ROADS COMMUNITY FOUNDATION YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 2014


The affiliate relationship between the Eastern Shore of Virginia Community Foundation and the Hampton Roads Community Foundation places stewardship of ESVCF capital assets with the Hampton Roads Community Foundation. Through its investment committee, which has investment oversight responsibility for an endowment of approximately \$297 million, the Hampton Roads Community Foundation seeks to invest resources prudently in order to preserve and grow the endowment's capacity to fund grants in accordance with donors' wishes today and in the future.

The Hampton Roads Community Foundation is committed to being a good steward of the assets entrusted to it by generous donors over the past 65 years. HRCF invests its resources wisely so they grow to meet future needs while providing funds for grants and scholarships today.

Oversight of their investment portfolio is handled by their investment committee, which works with their investment manager, Spider Management Company LLC of Richmond. Since 2011 the community foundation began investing with Spider Management through its Richmond Fund. The community foundation joins University of Richmond and 22 other nonprofit endowments as Spider Management partners.

Spider Management focuses on diversification through approximately 80 portfolio managers. Below is a list of asset classes in which Spider Management invests. It also gives a snapshot of the portfolio's asset allocation as of December 31, 2014.

North-Accomack Little League - \$20,000: To help with the replacement of an inadequate concession stand and help with the construction of a permanent restroom facility. (1/27/2014)

Endowments created by partner organizations are identified as "Organizational Funds" within the ESVCF assets. ESVCF maintains an ongoing program of creating Organizational Funds for local nonprofit organizations. These relationships allow for management of dedicated endowments by the Hampton Roads Community Foundation through ESVCF while generating an annual income for the nonprofit. The Eastern Shore Community College Foundation created the first Organizational Fund with ESVCF in 2006. Since then, several additional partner groups have created endowments. ESVCF looks forward to assisting additional partner groups in the years ahead through this growing program.

How To Become A Donor

The Eastern Shore of Virginia Community Foundation offers simple and effective options for donors who wish to improve their community through philanthropy. All gifts to ESVCF can be funded with cash or through the donation of securities, real estate, or stock.

Funds Available to Donors

Donor Advised Funds - Donor advisors can contribute assets at any time and then recommend to the Foundation grants to nonprofit organizations from the advised funds they have established.

Field of Interest Funds - Donors are able to address an area of concern, such as arts and culture, education, the environment or human services. These funds allow the Foundation's Board to choose specific nonprofit organizations as grant recipients who meet a donor's criteria.

Unrestricted Funds - These funds support responsive and strategic grants and broad, evolving community needs. Decisions on using these funds are left to the discretion of the Foundation's Board of Directors, which regularly reviews proposals from area nonprofit organizations.

Scholarship Funds - These funds provide students with financial resources for college and other educational opportunities. Donors can establish criteria for the scholarship.

Designated Funds - Donors are able to select specific nonprofit organizations to receive support as long as the organizations remain in existence and continue their charitable purposes.





Argyle Fund Grants Awarded
